Courses

Seminar in College Teaching (GRAD:6217)

This course is designed primarily for graduate students planning to teach in their professional career. It will be offered this spring and fall (2 sections each semester). Classroom time will be spent on instruction involving techniques and strategies for teaching adult learners. Additionally, discussions of the classroom issues seminar students are facing in their teaching experiences will take place each week (although not all students will be currently teaching). Each student will write a teaching philosophy statement at the end of the course. This course is a popular choice for those planning to earn the Graduate College Certificate in College Teaching.

Writing for Learned Journals (GRAD:6300)

Graduate school leaves us with a number of promising yet incomplete projects. This seminar is designed as a workshop in which students deepen, develop and complete one of these projects. By demystifying the process of publication, teaching best practices for writing and research, and modeling rigorous peer-review, the course supports students in submitting a polished project to a learned journal in their field at the semester's end. This course examines knowledge creation across the disciplines and is open to students in any field of study in Fall 2019.
